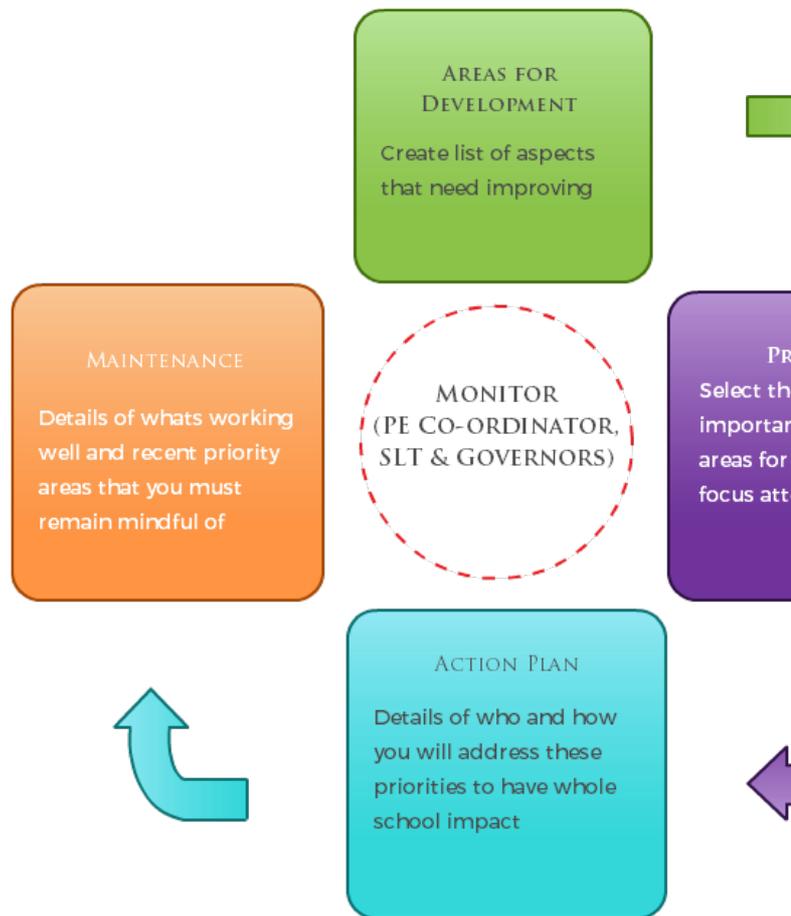

DO USE THE PRIMARY PE AND SPORT PREMIUM

Do not use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer. This means that you must not do the following:

Develop or add to the PE and sport activities that your school already offers

Make improvements now that will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

Therefore, you can use your funding to:

Employ qualified sports coaches to work with teachers

Provide existing staff with training or resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively

Introduce new sports or activities and encourage more pupils to take up sport

Support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs, holiday clubs and [Change4Life](#) clubs

Organise school sports competitions

Increase pupils' participation in the [School Games](#)

Share sports activities with other schools

Do not use your funding to:

Employ coaches or specialist teachers to cover [planning preparation and assessment \(PPA\)](#) arrangements - these should come out of your existing staffing budgets

Meet the minimum requirements of [the national curriculum](#) – including those specified for swimming.
